<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Government Degree College Kilhotran is a premier institution of higher learning in district Doda Jammu (J&K). It is an affiliated College of the University of Jammu, Jammu. It was established April 22, 2008. Initially functioning from a Higher Secondary School buildingKilhotran village, the College later shifted to the present campus in 2021. It earned recognition from the University Grant Commission (UGC) in 2011 under 12 (b) 2f). Its location is rural and is easily accessible to all areas of the tehsil Bhalessa including students of tehsil Thathri and tehsil Banjwah as well. The spatial spread of the various building of the College over some 80 Kanals of land is very meticulous which foreground its grandeur. All the departments have got optimum facilities. The College is a co-education College with regular shifts. There are 18 departments which together offer more than 20 programme justifying the academic flexibility that the College possesses. All these programmes are 100% CBCS courses.

The college accommodates an MANUU Study Centre (218) which caters to the distance education demands of the students of the district. The University of Jammu's Distance Education Programmes in the form of UG and B.Ed are also on offer in the College.

The College has a research instrumentation/facilitation centre, a state- of- the- art auditorium, Girls' Common Room, Gymnasium, Browsing Centre, Canteen and dispensary at its disposal. The College has been granted staff quarter and Girls hostel in 2022 by Higher Education Department.

Vision

The vision statement of the College reads:

By strengthening the teaching- learning process through innovative practices, the institution will stimulate the spirit of scientific enquiry and discovery in academics.By providing state- of- the- art institutional infrastructure and excellent human resources the College will foster a better educational environment.The institution will also impart training in entrepreneurial and life skills for enhancing employability.The College embraces its role as an intellectual, economics and cultural anchor for the region.

Mission

The College is driven to provide excellent educational opportunities that are responsive to the need of our students, and empower them to meet and exceed challenges as active participants in shaping the future of our world. The mission of the College is largely a program of augmenting the facilities that are already in place in the College and creating an atmosphere that enables inclusiveness, freewill and emboldening the social and ethical mores of the larger society. In specific terms it reads as under:

The institution shall continue to focus on creating student centric, conducive teaching-learning atmosphere all along the campus. It shall concentrate upon resolving burning national issues like unemployment, social intolerance and women rights etc. It shall assimilate and transmit the core values of equality, dignity and inclusiveness besides exhibiting honesty and transparency in all its endeavors. The institution shall pursue its motto of fulfilling the social obligations of eradication of illiteracy, poverty and other social evils through collaboration with voluntary groups and clubs. The institution also endeavors to achieve good governance through comprehensive digitization and augmenting its infrastructure to enable carrying out research programmes across disciplines.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

Institutional Strength

Status: The College caters to the educational demands of the students of the region and is accessible to all areas- rural and urban. Under 12 (b), 2 (f), the College stands recognized by the University Grant Commission (UGC) in 2011. The College has shifted in its own building in 2021.

ICT Technology: The College has almost 90% classrooms ICT enabled. There are more than 50 computers in place.

Campus: Wi-Fi enabled (though it is password protected).

Staff: Huge gamut of the faculty with M.Phil, Ph.D, NET, D.lit qualifications.

Facilities: Fully upgraded Volley ball and cricket ground for boys and Badminton court for girl students.

Tools: The College has a lawn mower, vacuum cleaner, agricultural tools for gardening, for ground maintenance. Dustbins are in place everywhere.

Canteen: A well maintained, electrified canteen, having water facility, open on all days.

Girls' Common Room: The girl students of the College have a separate common room hall wherein they play indoor games like carom, chess and table tennis. It has attached washroom facility.

Library: The College library is fully automated (RFID based) housing around 12 thousand (12000) books.

Reading Rooms: Facilities students to peruse the vast material available there. It also has a reference section which enables teachers and students to use vital reference books and encyclopedias.

Browsing Centre: students surf material on the internet using the facility.

MANUU Study Centre: Under graduate and PG students are enrolled for distance education programmes run by the College.

Digitization: Most of the aspects of College administration, admission, examination, evaluation are digitized.

Institutional Weakness

Institutional Weakness

The biggest hurdle in the path of this College achieving academic excellence and potential for turning into a great seat of learning is the untimely transfer of faculty that too in bulk. The College doesn't have a single PG course although it has the infrastructure to have so in at least some of the departments of Humanities and languages. Here again, the dearth of staff may prove detrimental to the opening of such classes in the College. There are no research avenues available in the College as there are no funds being allotted for such activities even though the College has a research centre in place. Since the College falls in the valley of mountainous region Jammu division, there isn't any foolproof arrangement of heating during winters which are generally harsh. The lack of such facility cripples the academic atmosphere and students don't turn up for classes or to visit the library. It somehow punctures the efforts of making a robust arrangement of academics, discussions and sharing of knowledge. The non-existence of a language lab puts our language students at a disadvantage since they don't get exposed to the internal theater of sound, acoustics and intonation at all.

Institutional Opportunity

Institutional Opportunity

The College definitely wants PG courses to be introduced in the College. For this, the affiliating University must take a giant leap and provide logistic and academic support as the College faculty is well trained and has academic-cum-research experience at their back. The faculty is competent enough to act as guided and co-guides and conduct research across disciplines. The College has signed MOUs with different institutes; it could also have on board many more industrial and diary/apiculture units as there is scope for employability in such courses especially in the particular district. Conducting more coaching classes to students for JKCET, JUET and Civil Services and organize more national/international conferences.

Institutional Challenge

Institutional Challenge

Developing research culture in the campus could also prove to be a challenge if funds aren't released regularly and if the faculty transfer is done in bulk like the previous one. The College would also need to upgrade its research infrastructure if it is allowed to start research programmes. Adoption of NEP-2020 and competition from other Colleges who have more diverse programming opportunities and resources for students. The College has been at the vanguard of creating a society that has ideal human and ethical sensibilities. In that direction NSS wing of the College often holds cleanliness drives in and around the College to instill a sense of responsibility in the students and the general public that the college and other natural water bodies, wetlands, grasslands and mountains belong to them and they much guarantee their cleanliness and more importantly their safety. As such many best practices have been undertaken by the faculty and students of the College. Complete fee waiver is given to orphans and students who are specially-abled. The College has lately extended its academic outreach to areas beyond the traditional teaching- learning mode. Due to some tough times, the online mode of teaching learning and giving and taking of tests has been met with prime success. It has led to a huge minimization of stagnation and dropout cases. The College wishes to upgrade its each and every aspect to be in line with the requirements and achieve the best possible result vis-à-vis academics, assessment and accreditation.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Criteria 1. Curricular Aspect

The College has a clear vision for learning, research and extension and to be an instrument of change for peace, progress and prosperity for all. The College makes all effort to realize its mission of developing competent human resource through quality education, by creating innovative educational environment and promoting creativity to developed skilled human resource. The College has introduced market demanding courses like BCA, digital computer, skill courses in all subjects introduced in all the colleges of the state. The College has also introduced undergraduate courses in science stream in 2021.

The College provides opportunity for better exposure to the students by conducting field trips, technical training programme for students like computer applications through deputation to various reputed institute like NIELT Jammu. The University of Jammu alsoconducts various training workshops by inviting resource persons from various institutes, inside and outside the state.

To make the teaching and learning more innovative and interactive the College has been equipped with the modern gadgets like interactive boards (IP Boards), Visualizers, LCD projectors and other ICT tools, virtual labs and class rooms. The College has also devised state of the art Attendance Monitoring system for the employers.

However, it is pertinent to mention that the College is supposed to teach the curricular designed by the affiliating University and also makes efforts for curriculum improvement through its representative participating in boards of studies meeting who provides suggestions and inputs for revision of the syllabi in the respective Departments of the University of Jammu. The College has a committee to look after the effective implementation and timely completion of prescribed syllabi in various disciplines.

The College in future would like to design its curriculum in such a way that it offers diversity and flexibility to learners to a greater extent. It would also like to design courses as per the regional and national needs. However, to realize such goals, the College needs academic autonomy, for which efforts are being with full enthusiasm and sincerity. The mapping of the area for skill development Center of students is also taken care off.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Criteria 2. Teaching Learning and evaluation

The most important thing in teaching learning process of this institute is the ability of its teachers to create enthusiasm, ignite passion and generate curiosity among the students. The teachers are deputed off and on to participate in various conferences, seminars and symposia, orientation and refresher courses to boost their teaching skills and make their teaching more innovative and effective. The admission process of the college is managed by the college admission committee which is responsible for designing admission forms and prospectus and counseling of the students at the entry level. The admission in NEP 2020 is made through entrance test (CUET conducted by NTA) from 2023-24 whereas in other subjects it is based on the merit in the qualifying examination with special concession to educationally backward sections of the society. To cater to the diverse needs of the student's various subject combination are offered according to their liking and competence. The admission process is followed by academic calendar which facilitates students for participation in various curricular and co-curricular activities. The admission committee also designs general time table, providing specific time slots for internet browsing, using library services, for EDUSAT lectures, invited lectures by eminent personalities, sports and other such activities.

IQAC of the College supported by the senior faculty members to monitor all the curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities in the College and ensures all the necessary support to teachers and students for better teaching and learning processes.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Criteria 3. Research Innovation and extension

The College management encourages its teachers to submit research proposals, and conduct research for which a research committee has been in place to facilitate the research and extension activities. The committee organizes workshops and sensitization programs to create research spirit among teachers and students, some faculty members are going to take/sanction research project in future. Many teachers in the college have published their research papers in reputed National and International journals with good impact factors.

The institution is also actively involved in extension activities help society by its services. The college has one vibrant unit of NSS through which college renders social and community services. Besides organizing blood donation camps, environmental awareness programs training and helping in disaster management, the college has adopted a village namely Kilhotran for five years and another village is under survey for adoption.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Criteria 4. Infrastructure and learning resources.

The institution has a clear-cut policy for improving the infrastructural facilities which would facilitate teaching learning process. The college has about 433966.5 sq.ft built up area, in three structure, spread over more than 30 kanals of land and few more structures are under construction. These structures house 10 class rooms, with proper lighting, seating and ventilation, 10 technology enabled smart class rooms, a state of the art auditorium/conference rooms with a seating capacity of 80, equipped with modern audio and visual instruments, administrative and staff room, examination and admission cells, fully automated library with more than 11000 books and journals, and browsing centre with 15 broad band connected computers with hot and cool AC's4 laboratories equipped with good amount of instrumentation, botany, zoology and chemistry laboratories, girls recreation/ common room, canteen, first Aid centre, garage, botanical garden principal quarter and many washrooms and separate toilet blocks of girls and boys.

The College has also provided safe drinking water facility through installation of aqua-guard at various places in the campus, principal quarter and in the staff room. Uninterrupted electricity supply is ensured in the campus

with the help of one 62 KV and one small Genset, and many inverters and UPS systems. The college has separate one electric transformer for suitable power supply installed in the campus boundary wall. The college also extend support for conduct of examination for different recruitment like SSRB, etc.

Transport facility is provided with the help of a 43 seated bus and purchase of two more 36 seated vehicles is in progress. The college has a botanical garden and many lush green lawns to beautify its campus, besides a playground spread over 3 acres of land for outdoor games and athletics. In IT infrastructure, the college is equipped with more than 55 computers, of which more than 15 are internet connected, and purchase of 50 more computers is in pipeline, besides having 10 interactive boards with visualizes and LCD projectors installed in major department. The networking has been installed in all the departments including IQAC and library.

Student Support and Progression

Criteria 5. Students support and progression

Once admitted in the college, the students are taken care of by providing various facilities in the form of indoor and outdoor sports facilities, encouragement for participation in co-curricular activities, besides supporting deserving students with financial assistance from the College and assisting them to benefit from the state Govt. and central Govt. sponsored scholarship schemes with records of more than Rs. 10,0000 have been sanctioned through various schemes to about more than 100 deserving students in the last two years, to support the education of poor students. The PMSSS center has also been established in the College for the convenience of the students.

The institution publishes its updated prospectus, which highlight the facilities available in the college having information about different committees of the College, College annual calendar, NSS, library facilities, sports activities, scholarship and career counseling etc. The College also publishes its annual magazine "The Daagan" which provides a plate form for their creative writing, besides publishing half yearly newsletter "The Kalgoni" which highlights the students curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

The College also conducts coaching and remedial classes for the aspiring students. The College has well established career counseling for guiding students towards a better career and providing job opportunities through campus interviews with the supports of prospective employers visiting this institution for placement of students in service. Important agencies which visited this institution under UDAAN were future human development and Canara bank.

For the support and care of female students of the college has a well-developed women development cell, Girls rest room/recreation room and girls park in front of the College for their health and hygiene.

Students from socially and economically weaker sections of the society and physically challenged get fair amount of attention in admissions, financial support, remedial coaching, transport facility and career counseling. Interaction of the parents with local PRFs, BDC chairpersons and councilors to project their demands and highlights the various issues of the students' community DDC councilors inspire the students and provide the infrastructural supports. One BCA lab has been recently established under District capex budget sponsored by the DDC councilor change Bhalessa.

In addition, the institute has granted membership to the students in various administrative bodies of the College such as Grievance and Redressal Committee, Literary Activities Committee, Magazine Committee, tours and

travels Committee, Library Committee, Sports Committee and IQAC of the College.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Criteria 6. Governance, leadership and management

The College is a government run institution hence its management and organization is decided by state government. The principal is appointee of the state Government as are the other staff members. Principal is the local head of the institution that sets internal policies and programs of the College with the association of Heads/ Coordinators of various departments, conveners of different committees, librarian, examination and senior member of non-teaching staff.

The budget allocation to the College is made by the state Government which is disbursed by the principal to different department/ committees for purchasing books, equipment's and other necessary expenditure. The financial management is assisted by the accountant deputed for this purpose by the Finance Department of the State Government. The College has well defined policies with clear goals for improving academic quality and infrastructure. The college interacts with students through a feedback mechanism, besides giving participation to students as obtained through teacher-parents meeting and meetings with civil society and alumni association.

The organizational changes for internal matters areaffected by the head of the institution, however changes at higher level of the organizational hierarchy are carried out by the Higher Education Department of the State government.

The College has a well-established IQAC which is instrumental as a part of all developmental decisions of the college including infrastructural and academic development. The IQAC frames a schedule of meeting at the beginning of the session with different departments to assess their progress on monthly basis. In the scheduled meetings the departments are accessed for their academic progress, attendance records, quantum of syllabi completed, tutorials, assignments and student's presentation, etc. The departments are also assessed for their infrastructural needs. The IQAC is crucial in playing a catalytic rule to usher the developmental and academic initiatives in the institution.

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	NEP 2020' provides a comprehensive framework for primary education, higher education and vocational training in both rural and urban India. In order to accomplish all of the crucial targets and goals of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, such a challenging aim will demand that the entire educational system be redesigned to support and nurture learning. (a) Government Degree college Kilhotran uses a teaching strategy that acknowledges, pinpoints, and cultivates each student's individual potential through sensitization of teachers and parents

	Papers' available to students of all disciplines. Interdisciplinary subjects were encouraged for students to choose because it will help the students acquire knowledge across the course. Courses in the multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary fields have been added as electives to academic programmes. Every programme is created to give students as much freedom as possible when selecting electives from other departments. (c) The college provides a number of adaptable and cutting-edge curricula in the fields of value-based education, environmental education, and community engagement and service through NSS. Throughout their undergraduate studies, students are always encouraged to take use of a flexible multidisciplinary curriculum, such as computer training, yoga training, and first aid training. Individual departments, the IQAC cell, the student activities cell, and so on hold a number of seminars and webinars on a wide range of fields. (d) In order to promote multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary education, faculties across the departments delivered popular lectures. (e) The college has a dedicated NSS team with whom students collaborate on outreach and community service projects for the elderly and orphans, as well as environmental awareness campaigns. (f) Academic and career counselling from experts was available to all pupils. Counsellors were always vigilant in ensuring the pupils' physical, psychological, and emotional well-being. It might be claimed that the College is actively working to put the NEP's recommendations into practice.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The University of Jammu has made it compulsory from 2022 onward to register the students on Digilocker for creation of ABC Id. Our Affiliating University has implemented NEP-2020. As a result, we have more understanding about the academic bank of credits envisaged in the policy shape up. We believe this historic education policy will produce great effects, and we have worked hard to assure its successful implementation.
3. Skill development:	The affiliated university has tailored its curriculum in the light of the growing need for skilled workers in both the public and commercial sectors. There are many courses featured in the curriculum under NEP 2020 that are skill oriented. The current imperative is to generate a young generation with degrees in their

	chosen fields and extra training programmes that will enable them to launch their own entrepreneurship after graduating from college. Other effective methods used by the institution for skill development include scientific workshops, sports competitions, etc. The syllabus of each subject is structured in such a way that students are required to complete application oriented compulsory modules ('Skill Enhancement Courses' in Semesters 3 to 6 sem in CBCS and in NEP from Sem 1 to 3), which relate to skill development, problem solving, and analytical thinking, all of which are essential to STEM. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Since the College is affiliated to University of Jammu, therefore follows the guidelines and methods prescribed by the University of Jammu to carry out continuous internal evaluation system at the college level. The teachers of the college, at beginning of every academic year, apprise students about the evaluation process and schedule. Before the beginning of session, teaching plans and internal assessment Schedules are prepared. Examination Committee is formulated to monitor the continuous evaluation in theory and practical to ensure uniformity across courses and departments under CBSC scheme. The concerned faculty members of each department prepare question papers carefully according to the University norms. The question paper is set keeping in view the level of the students. The marks of each question are distributed as per the guidelines. The question paper then set to the convener Examination, for further submission to the head of the Institution through secret means. The tests are conducted following a centralized date sheet issued by the Controller of Examinations of the College after through deliberations with the heads of different departments and Principal. The question papers are xeroxed fifteen minutes in advance. 75 percent of attendance of students is also considered to be the eligibility for appear in the final theory and practical examination. The examination is conducted with free and fair manner as per University norms. The Invigilator maintains discipline, code and conduct in the examination hall as per examination rules. After the completion of the examination the answer sheets of the students are evaluated by the faculty members in a time bound manner. The teacher ensures impartiality and fairness. The internal tests are conducted for 20/10/15 marks. For the practical courses that follows 25 marks, the attendance id given 5 marks weight age. Assignment which are given 20 marks weight age, are conducted methodologically which include question papers as per University patterns. To ensure transparency, students are asked to write the tests in bluebooks provided by the college. The relevant subject teachers counsel the weak students to fare well in the text exams. Immediately after the culmination of the internal assessment tests, evaluation process is set in and marks scored by students are made available to them. Intimation about the failure students is disclosed to the students in the classroom for the concerned to take note and appear for a retest as scheduled by the examination committee. Option of retest is also provided to the students who intend to improve upon their previous scores. If students miss internal Assessment due to valid reasons like health issue, any calamity etc. they are given the benefit to undergo supplementary test. Proper notifications are issued in all such cases which are uploaded on the college website or the official face book page/ handle. Also, there is a case of bulk SMS being sent to the students whenever internet is snapped due to some reason. This way they get to know about the date of ensuing theory/internal practical exam. Transparency and objectivity in evaluation system is completely ensured in this way. The final results of Internal Assessment record of the students in the award register duly verified by the respective HODs and Principal of the College, and final verification is done by a team appointed by the University.

- Hard copy of syllabi and Learning Outcomes are available in the departments for ready reference to the teachers and students.
- Students are motivated towards course outcomes throughout the course of the programme by course teacher.
- Students are encouraged, guided to learn and imbibe these outcomes. They are also percolated to students through organization and participation of co-curricular activities.

Programme outcomes are the total expectations or a gist of those that need to be accomplished to make a programme successful. The college offer graduation in Arts, science and CA. Besides these, many other professional skill courses are offered by the College in collaboration with various agencies like NIELIT Jammu, etc. The attainment of these programme and course outcomes is measured systematically from the classroom level to the final exam level, conducted by the University of Jammu, to which the college is affiliated. The measurement of these outcomes starts at the classroom level where the teacher conducts formative and summative tests. He/she assesses their classroom demeanor also. Similarly group discussions are held where students are part in reflective corners/positions to voice their opinions/ideas etc. The debates and seminar committee holds seminars. Cultural programmes on various themes like women empowerment, scientific Advancement, Leadership Qualities, Drug De-addiction and social justice. The activities conducted by NSS, NCC DPE and S have the programme outcomes of building the students capabilities with regard to leadership, discipline and social cohesion etc. The coordinators, conveners of these departments stress for the attainment of these outcomes. During the helping of these activities, they measure the level of attainment of such outcomes. The entire faculty briefs the students about the overall programme outcomes of the course. To this pursuit induction programmes are conducted to make it clear to the students what their role and responsibility is vis-à-vis their career. The College provides opportunity to all the students for improving their performance which, in turn, results in better attainment of course outcomes. The college follows a feedback system to assess the teaching learning outcomes.

The practical courses are evaluated by means of external practical examinations wherein an examiner appointed by the affiliated University conducts examination as per rules set by the University. Class tests are arranged to gain confidence in the relevant subject and the weaker areas are identified and discussed with the student. The assignments are assigned to students to enable them to gain more knowledge on the subject. Discussions and meetings are held by the Principal, HODs and staff members regarding curricular programme, academic programmes, and methods to be implemented in terms with vision and mission of the institution.

Govt. Degree College Kilhotran is blessed with a huge area of land, building and staff to cater to the learning demandsof the students who seek admission here. There is a cluster of lecture hall in the building, where teaching learning takes place. Almost 90% of the classrooms are ICT enabled, with interactive boards. The College has a browsing centre which students use to surf material and ideas on the internet. This way they remain aware of the advances in science, technology, Arts, Poetry and International relations etc. The College library is under automation process where students can borrow and return a book easily. The books of all kinds are available here. It has a separate reference section and career corners as well. Diligent students make use of such facilities on a routine basis. The library has a well developed e-resource centre as well. It also provides remote access to the faculty of the College. Many courses offered by the College have practical as one of the components. The subjects include Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Computer Application. Other skill courses also have practical portions. The College also has standard laboratory infrastructure to cater to such demands of the students.

Incubation cell and entrepreneurship and skill development cell are in place. Through these, many external agencies tend to sign MOUs with the College for student exchange programmes. Recently scores of students have had the opportunity to go to different industrial/ technical units in the valley to learn skill courses. The college has a small but beautiful e-content room which functions to the optimum and helps create video lectures for the benefit of students.GDC Kilhotran has been set up in the land 79.7 kanal in a quite accessible location. The college building is well structured and shaped as per the requirement of students. The structure comprises of well furnished ICT classrooms, Smart Rooms, Multipurpose hall, Laboratories, computer centre and a big playground. Apart from it, college has provided drinking facilities with purifier and separate toilet facilities to staff members and students. The college has a computer and Wi-Fi facility. The computer Lab is well equipped with an Interactive Board, a fixed projector, two air conditioner and 40 numbers of computers with Wi-Fi and LAN facility with 24*7 power back up. A portable projector is also available for the demonstration of practicals. The browsing centre has been set up with 15 computers and internet facility.

Also, the stress is given to the purchase of latest version of hardware and software to meet the need of the newly introduced programs and courses. The institution regularly updates its IT facilities. It is evident from the following facts:

- Earlier, the college has a multipurpose hall with a portable projector facility but, now, it has been replaced and updated with a latest version Kyan projector and screen to convert it into a smart seminar hall.
- The eight number of class rooms in the college have also been provided with digital interactive panels for the conduct of classes through digital means.
- One smart room has been set up with high-tech facilities like interactive digital board, a laptop and a podium.
- The computer and Botany laboratory has been provided with interactive boards to carry out presentation in practical. The computer laboratory has been provided with Wi-Fi and LAN facility.
- The physics, chemistry, Zoology and Botany has been provided with a portable projector to demonstrate the practical.
- The old computers of science departments, computer laboratory, and office have been updated time to time by using antivirus software.
- The entire academic block including library has now access to Wi-Fi. Apart from this the entire

campus has access to CNN 4G access points.

- The library is under the process of updation from the traditional system to the automated library management system.
- In 2018-19, the college has 2 VPN Broadband connections. In 2021-22 the college has 2 VPN Broadband, CNN Wi-Fi and 02 fiber connection.
- The college has been brought under CCTV camera surveillance for the safety of the students. Eleven cameras have been installed in various locations of the campus.
- The College has its own Website which is updated on regular basis to provide latest information relating to academics, committees, examination, results and other notifications like tender notices. Most of the academic and administrative processes are online and fully automated.
- The browsing centre has been set up in the College with 12 computers and internet facility.
- The E-content Centre has been in establishment stage where students can access E-Content in the centre and faculty can prepare the e-content/video lessons in the centre.
- The entire campus has been provided with a generator facility to meet the power requirements. The computer laboratory has been provided with online and offline UPS. The science departments and office sections have been provided with inverter facility.

A number of computers have been upgraded, both in quantity and quality. The ICT rooms have interactive boards as well. Each department of the college has its own computer system. Printers and UPS making it easy for them to conduct various classes of academic life in the College.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits

regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Financial audit is an annual activity which the College undergoes regularly. There are two kinds of external financial audits conducted annually, one by the finance department of state govt. and the other by the Accountant General (AG). The queries raised by these auditors through different para's are properly answered by the College. The salary is reconciled by the Accounted General (AG) office. The financial matters are routed through cashier and accountant.

The account section and the principal periodically review the expenditure of the previous year and also plan and scrutinize the proposed budget for the forth coming year. This budget proposal is presented to the Director Planning Higher Education department for approval. The account section and the committees framed within the college, guided by the principal are responsible for managing the funds received. The works are executed by the executing agencies of the govt. on completion of the project; utilization certificate and audited statement of accounts are forwarded to the Director Planning and Director Finance, Higher Education Department. The financial transactions for expenditure are made through treasures/BEAMS and funds are received through BEAMS. The procedure for financial transaction is more effective and ensures greater transparency with the proof of Transactions. The government agencies like Director of Audit and Inspection and Accountant General Office conduct the audit of the account books of the college each year. They monitor whether purchase of items has been undertaken keeping in view the codal formalities. The codal formalities include whether proper tendering has been done, before the items was purchased, whether GST bills have been maintained and whether GeM portal has been accessed for the purchase of certain equipments, machinery. A final report (Audit para) on their part is compiled in which certain queries are raised which the college responds to for clearance thereof. Thus the cycle of audit, both internal and external, is regular and comprehensive to plug any loopholes and complacencies that the institution may have exhibited inadvertently.

Internal audits were conducted from time to time in the college like purchase bill approval through purchase committee of the college, tax verification of employees every year, seventh pay fixation/Arrears and stock verification of existing infrastructure.

It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The IQAC of the College is one unit which has a lot of say in policy implementation and strategic planning within the college. A good number of practices are in vogue in the College- a couple of which are enlisted under:

1. Use of ICT for teaching-learning.

On the basis of the current development in the field of teaching, the following steps have been taken for introducing the use of ICT for teaching-learning process.

- The eight numbers of smart classrooms.
- One smart room has been set up with high tech facilities like interactive digital board, a laptop and a podium.
- The computer and botany laboratory has been provided with interactive boards to carry out presentation in practical. The computer laboratory has been provided with Wi-Fi.
- The Zoology and chemistry laboratory has been provided with a portable projector and interactive boards to demonstrate the practical.
- The College multipurpose hall has been equipped with Kyon projector and screen to convert it into a smart seminar hall.
- The library is under the process of updation from the traditional system to the automated library management system.
- The bandwidth of Wi-Fi of internet connection is more than 20 Mbps.
- The college has its own website which is updated on regular basis to provide latest information relating to academics, committees, examination, results and other notifications like tender notices. Most of the academic and administrative processes are online and fully automated.
- The browsing centre has been set up in the college with 12 computers and internet facility.
- The faculty was deputed for training on ICT through NIELIT, Jammu.
- Faculty has prepared E-content that has been loaded on College website and the outcome is promising to the College.
- Online feedback system is introduced for feedback on curriculum, teacher and alumni.

In 2020, all exams were conducted online. The submission of awards, evaluation was done online. Class work shifted to online mode with interfaces Google Classroom, Teachmint, ZOOM and Wise APP being used. ZOOM interface was used to hold webinars. The college students can apply for scholarship through online mode on the NSP portal.

Clean and Green Campus

With the aim of maintaining clean and green campus and to create awareness regarding environment and swachhta, certain crucialsteps have been taken. The goal of the given practice was to maintain ecofriendly campus by adopting new strategies and methods and to organize various activities involving students to promote Swachhta in campus and society. The students are motivated to promote the Reduce, Reuse and recycle the resources. Extension activities have been conducted to imbibe the spirit of cleanliness. The use of LEDs in the college campus has led to saving of electricity bill. Waste management practices have been implemented. Students and faculty members in the campus are seen using and promoting them. One side of blank page is reused for printing purposes. The plantation drive is conducted for green initiatives to sensitize the students and staff by drafting its Green policy, Environment policy and Swachhta policy and uploading it on college website.

The institution shows gender sensitivity by providing facilities such as:

§ **Close Gate System**: The College has a close gate system, which means that the gate closes at 10:15 a.m in the morning and there is no free movement for entry or exit during class hours. Only approved visitors are allowed by the gatekeeper after 14:00 hours.

§ **Internal Compliant Committee**: an internal compliant committee is established to solve the problems faced by students. A compliant box is placed in the College where students can put their complaints and suggestions without revealing their names. Once in a week, the box is opened by the Convener Grievance and Redressal Committee along with other committee members and proper action is taken on the complaints received.

§ Sexual Harassment Committee: Sexual Harassment Committee is functioning in the College in which any student or any staff member can approach the committee members in case of any type of sexual harassment faced at the workplace.

§ Anti Ragging Committee: As per the directions of the Supreme Court, ragging is banned in the College. An anti-ragging committee is well in place in the College to take stern action against the student if found guilty.

§ Women Development Cell: The College has a dedicated Women Development Cell for the welfare of the female students. In order to empower students on moral and ethical values, the cell takes necessary steps.

§ **Identity Cards:** The College has managed to provide the identity cards to students which carry all the important information such as: Name with photograph, class, semester, DOB, Parentage, contact details of the respective candidates. Students are allowed in college premises and books are also issued for 15 days from library on the production of college ID card.

1. Counseling: A Career-Counseling cell is functional in the College. The committee members counsel the students during admission and help them to decide and choose the subjects as per their ability and interest. Guidance is approved to the students throughout the session to motivate them to continue

their studies especially the married ones. The final semester students are also guided to choose various fields of their interest. The students are motivated to join NCC and NSS and are facilitated for their achievement and made an exemplary figure for the next generation of students. The College counseling cell also interacts with the students on various problems faced by them and also provides them awareness about gender sensitization issues. A course on "Gender Sensitization" in semester 3rd has been opted in the subject of Sociology as a skill course (USOTS-302). Remedial classes are also run by various departments for weak and under privileged students.

2. Common Room: The female students are provided with a girl's common room where they have a leisure time and rest in between free periods. It has attached washroom with dustbins. Also, there is LED TV in common room for the student's recreation purpose. Response:

In Govt. Degree College Kilhotran, emphasis is laid down to maintain a clean, green and pollution free environment that provides a natural backdrop for an effective teaching learning experience. Various steps have been taken to conserve the natural resources like plantation, water and solid waste management etc. and to provide a pollution free environment. The College strives its best to develop a green ecosystem to provide enrichment to the mind, heart and soul of the students. All the avenues and roads within the

campus are, therefore, adorned with tall beautiful trees. The first step taken for the green campus is to establish a viable green campus/beautification committee, with in the organizational structure of the college. The administration of the College believes that everyone has to work out time bound strategies to implement the green campus initiatives. These strategies need to be incorporated in to the institutional planning and budgeting processes with the aim of developing a clean and green campus. The college IQAC has framed the green policy, Environment policy, Swachhta policy with action plan and green initiatives for its campus. These green campus initiatives have enabled the institution to develop the ambience of the campus.

Use of LED bulbs: There are a lot of variables when it comes to a student's success in the College. Good study habits, passionate teachers and valuable campus resources that students experience, all contribute to a positive College experience. One unexpected way in which a College can have a positive impact on learning atmosphere is indoor and outdoor LED lightening system. LED bulbs have been installed in the classrooms and other parts of the College which fulfill the lightening needs as well as reduce electric energy consumption. Thus, the use of LED bulbs provides financial benefits to the institution and also, conserves energy.

Utilizing Natural Light:

The College building architecture is designed in such a manner that permits the free flow of air and allows natural light to cover all the corners in the building. The natural light provides enough light to avoid the usage of electric lights in the corridors. Thus, it reduces electric energy consumption.

Waste segregation: In GDC Kilhotran, encouragement is given to adopt environmentally friendly practices like solid waste management. To reduce waste at the institute, students and staff are educated on cleanliness and proper waste management practices through lectures, displaying the slogan boards in the campus. The waste is collected on a daily basis from various sources and is separated as dry and wet waste. Color coded dustbins are used for different types of waste, Green for wet and blue for solid waste.

Keeping Campus Clean and Green:

Sweeping a mopping of the whole campus is done on daily basis. Toilets are also cleaned regularly to maintain hygienic environment. The use of plastic is banned inside the college campus. The students are motivated to keep campus clean through SwachhtaAbhiyans conducted by NSS/Eco Club Units. The plantation drives are conducted every year to maintain greenery in the campus. Every year, the flowers are planted and maintained to provide ethnic ambience to the institution. The College campus is enriched with a vast number of trees of different species. Various Environmental conservation programs and promotion activities like seminars, symposiums and painting competitions on Environment Day, ozone day, etc. are conducted to aware the students about the need to maintain a clean and green campus. Thus, the College faculty, students and staff understand their collective responsibility of contributing towards maintaining a sustainable clean and green environment. The College is doing its best to maintain a pollution free environment in the area of Bhalessa. This can be a source of inspiration for others to follow.

Institutions have a role to play as far as augmenting the students' abilities is concerned. In the times of need and adversity, institution provides monetary supports to those who have either been orphaned or suffer from physical handicap or are differently abled. It also finances the education of those who belong to the lowest (economic) strata of the society. The objective is to help them pursue their academic
